



Directions from Thaddeus Stevens College to the Landis Valley Museum:

- 1. Start out going EAST on E KING ST / PA-462 E toward S BROAD ST. - go 0.1 mi
- 2. Take the 1st LEFT onto N BROAD ST / PA-462. Continue to follow N BROAD ST. If you reach RANCK AVE you've gone about 0.2 miles too far -go 0.2 mi
- 3. Turn RIGHT onto E CHESTNUT ST / PA-23 E. Continue to follow PA-23 E. - PA-23 E is just past GROFFTOWN RD - If you are on N BROAD ST and reach E FULTON ST you've gone a little too far - go 1.5 mi
- 4. Merge onto US-30 W via the ramp on the LEFT toward PA-23 E / NEW HOLLAND / HARRISBURG. go 2.1 mi
- 5. Take the PA-272 N exit. go 0.2 mi
- 6. Turn RIGHT onto PA-272 / OREGON PIKE. go 1.9 mi
- 7. Turn LEFT onto LANDIS VALLEY RD. LANDIS VALLEY RD is 0.3 miles past VALLEYBROOK DR If you reach WHITEMARSH DR you've gone about 0.1 miles too far qo 0.06 mi
- 8. Take the 1st RIGHT onto KISSEL HILL RD. - If you reach E DELP RD you've gone about 0.1 miles too far go 0.05 mi
- 9. 2451 KISSEL HILL RD is on the RIGHT. - If you reach the end of KISSEL HILL RD you've gone a little too far


## AUG. 45;30 SLATE ROOFING DEMONSTRATION & 6:30 RECEPTION at LANDIS VALLEY

The opening reception for IPTW will be held in the historic Yellow Barn at the Landis Valley Village and Farm Museum, 2451 Kissel Hill Road, Lancaster. This living history village and farm, collects, preserves and interprets the history and material culture of the Pennsylvania German rural community from 1740 to 1940. Brothers Henry Kinzer Landis (1865-1955) and George Diller Landis (1867 - 1954) amassed a very large and diverse collection of Pennsylvania German material culture and opened the museum in 1925. It is currently operated by the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission.

This historic site will provide a wonderful setting for our reception. Tamanend Winery, a local Lancaster County winery, will provide a tasting of a variety of their wines and deGruchy Masonry will provide their very own micro brew beer.

Just prior to the reception, there will be a demonstration of slate roofing on the bake oven at the Federal Farm area of Landis Valley Village and Farm Museum, by members of the Slate Roofing Contractors Association.
